

What? UNDERWATER HOTELS

Why? Fancy sleeping with the fishes (in a good way)? We've already seen underwater rooms at Dubai's Atlantis Hotel (atlantisthepalm.com), underwater hotels like the one-room Utter Inn. Lake Mälaren, Sweden (gounusual.com/ utterinn), and the three-room Jules' Undersea Lodge off Key Largo, Florida (jul.com), but as land becomes more and more pricey, forward-thinking hoteliers are moving towards building entire resorts under the waves. The Water Discus Underwater Hotel in Dubai, due to open later this year, is the pioneer and will feature a disc-like floor 10m below sea level, with 21 suites with aquarium-style windows. The hotel will have a spa, garden and pool, and guests will be able to explore their surroundings in scuba gear. Feeling claustrophobic? Don't worry, for a constant change of scene, the hotel will be able to revolve and, in emergencies, can rise to the surface. How? Check deep-ocean-technology.

Where? SRI LANKA

Why? Ten years after the devastating Boxing Day tsunami, Sri Lanka is on the up. The people behind the country's prettiest boutique bungalows, Ceylon Tea Trails (teatrails.com), have launched a gorgeous oceanfront resort half an hour from Galle called Cape Weligama, and are planning a 24-suite tented camp in the Yala National Park in November. Plus, this summer sees the opening of Tri: a beautifully designed, sustainable eco lodge on Lake Koggala, 20km south-east of Galle. It will have eight suites, three with private pools, hidden away in the landscape, and two more high up on the top deck of the central water tower. The east of the country has virtually undiscovered national parks and jungles, and its first eco resort, Gal Oya Lodge, opened last summer in the heart of Gal Oya National Park. Watch elephants swim in the Bolgoda Lake - Sri Lanka's largest - or trek in the remote jungle. How? Seven nights at Cape Weligama, half-board, including selected wines, return flights from London Heathrow to Colombo and transfers, costs £2,925pp; blacktomato.com. Rates for Tri (trilanka. com) are yet to be confirmed. Gal Oya Lodge has doubles from around £250, half-board; galoyalodge.com.



What? GOING LOCAL

Why? All things 'local' continue to be a big deal: local produce, locavore restaurants (using exclusively local ingredients), living like a local (staying in real homes via airbnb.co.uk, wimdu.co.uk, couch surfing.org and onefine stay.com), dining with locals (colunching.com,

eatwith.com, bookalokal.com). Be Mate (bemate.com) takes the Airbnb concept one step further. With 2,500 apartments to rent, the difference is that by hooking up with local hotels, Be Mate offers optional hotel services like a 24-hour concierge or room-key delivery.

Currently operating in 10 cities, it aims to expand to 150 in 2015. **How?** Prices at airbnb. co.uk, onefinestay.com and wimdu.co.uk start at around £35 a night, room only; bemate.com has prices from around £90, room only; free stays are available with couchsurfing.org.



Why? Astro tourism – actively seeking out stellar shows – is the Next Big Thing, with this winter predicted to be the best chance of seeing the Northern Lights until 2025. The tiny village of Luosto is a viewing hotspot, with seven downhill slopes tucked away in the fells of Finnish Lapland. It is also home to the Hotel Aurora, a collection of stylish igloo-esque rooms that, from February, will also offer 10 new luxury glass suites. With unrivalled views through the walls and roof, they are designed to make you feel part of the polar landscape. Just lie back and wait for the Northern Lights to perform.

How? The Glass Arctic View Rooms start at a £212pp supplement as part of The Aurora Zone's holidays to Luosto. Trips start at £1,399pp, including return flights from London Heathrow to Kittila, transfers, four nights' half-board accommodation, a night in a Glass Arctic View Room, activities (including an aurora hunt via snowmobile-pulled sled and dinner in a traditional wooden kota), guides and cold-weather clothing. SOCIAL MEDIA STAYS

Why? With @Stayful's #tweetstay paving the way for social-media booking (tweet your dates and destination and they find you the cheapest room), Beautiful Destinations is now taking the web by storm. One of the largest travel accounts on Instagram -with 2.6 million followers and counting - it posts the most photogenic places, hotels and food from around the world, all from shots submitted

Where? Andaman Islands


Why? This gorgeous string of islands east of India has always been under the radar, despite their white sand, clear sea and Crusoe-esque feel, as there was nowhere really 'wow' to stay. Enter Jalakara on Havelock Island, the boho-luxe baby of Londoner Mark Hill (a trained chef) and his shoe designer wife Atalanta Weller. Opened at the end of 2014, it has seven suites (one a honeymoon villa), a 16m infinity pool, yoga and cookery classes, while the perfect Man Friday beach is a 10-minute stroll away.

How? Ampersand Travel offers a sevennight stay at Jalakara from £1,400pp, B&B, including flights and transfers; ampersandtravel.com.



Where?

Why? Living Architecture, which promotes specially commissioned, top-architect-designed holiday rentals, has a fabulous one coming up from Essex artist Grayson Perry. Near Wrabness, A House For Essex will be an artwork in itself, and will also be used as a showcase for Perry's work – much of it inspired by his home county. How? Price on application. Other projects average around £23pp per night, based on 8-10 sharing; living-architecture.co.uk.

What? EXPERIENTIAL TRAVEL

Why? 'Experiential' is the number-one buzzword right now: holidays are no longer just about where you go. but what you do when you get there. Whether it's going on safari, watching gorillas in the wild or even travelling into space (almost), it's the experience we're after, rather than visiting a particular country or staying in a hotspot hotel. According to Serge Dive. co-founder of influential travel trade show Pure Life

Experiences: 'People now think about travel with a "bucket list" mindset. Luxury alone is not enough - we want to feel that we are changed by the trip." How? Think trekking in Bhutan (greaves india.co.uk), seeing Northern Lights (see above left), or going on a walking safari in Kenya (chelipeacock.com). If you can dream it, you can do it.

What? HYPER-HIGH TECH

Why? Due for a phone upgrade? Grab yourself the fanciest kind on offer, as over the next 10 years, you'll be able to demand incredible levels of holiday customisation through vour mobile, from the air temperature in your hotel room to the strength of the vitamin C-infused water in your rainhead shower. Plus, according to travel site Skyscanner, wearable electronics will be a massive deal; smart watch apps will double

as room keys and let you download boarding passes - so get your name down for the Apple Watch, out this year. Other predictions include hotel walls that double as interactive film screens and Skype monitors, and electronic pillows that provide massages and wakeup calls, Forget your toothbrush? Rustle one up on your in-room 3D printer, Welcome to the future. How? Watch this space...



Manila, has had an injection of high-end hotels in recent years.
