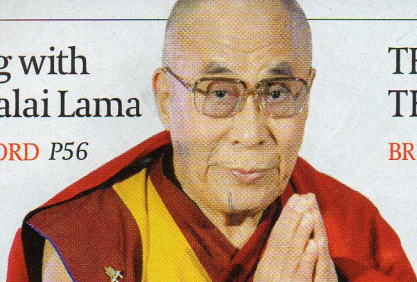

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Getting the flavour of...

Indian leopard-spotting in luxury

Set in an “arresting” landscape of fields, bush and sparsely forested inselbergs in Rajasthan, the newly opened Jawai Camp is “profoundly comfortable”. But more than the “gorgeous” views or the luxurious tented accommodation, it’s the chance to see leopards in the wild that captures the imagination here, says Maria Shollenbarger in the FT. Roughly 30 of the cats live near the camp, which is situated in a relatively unexplored area between Udaipur and Jodhpur, and local villagers are quite unfazed by their presence. The animals hunt monkeys, antelopes and porcupines by night, and retreat to the hills by day; on jeep safaris at dawn and dusk, there’s an 80% chance of spotting one. The rest of the time, guests can join in conservation and research activities, and enjoy the camp’s spa tent, infinity pool and organic kitchen garden. *Greaves Travel* (020-7487 9111, www.greavesindia.co.uk) has a ten-night trip from £3,425pp.
